In 2009, I started the Missoula Butterfly House and Insectarium with three other founding board members around a table at Break Espresso. Since day one, our dream has been to open a tropical butterfly house and insectarium in Missoula, MT. And in 2015, we took our first big step in that direction by proudly opening the Missoula Insectarium as the first part of our vision.

As you might expect from a growing organization, each year has been better than the last. And thanks to your help, 2018 was certainly no exception.

Going beyond our school field trips, exhibits, and special programs, last year your support helped us "spread our wings" a little further. We introduced you to a host of new animals. In June, we unveiled a new exhibit focusing on the development of extreme animal weapons. It was the first year we were able to offer summer camp scholarships. We expanded our educational outreach by producing an insect themed podcast (Bug Bytes) with Montana Public Radio. And thanks to you and a growing number of partners, we had our most successful year of fundraising.

But what really stood out in 2018 is something you've heard about, but largely took place behind the scenes. It was a year where a partnership we've developed with the Missoula County Weed District and Extension Office expanded from collaboration on pollination and insect biocontrol education programs to the solidification of a plan to achieve the long-term dream that started our organization a decade ago.

A 2,500 square foot tropical butterfly house. Twice our current exhibit space. A larger classroom. And grounds that include an outdoor classroom, pollinator and wildflower demonstration gardens, and more. Combined with the host of education programs and opportunities our county partners offer, all of this will be housed in a new facility at the Missoula County Fairgrounds. This partnership is part of the first phase of exciting renovations that will be transforming our Fairgrounds in the years ahead.



So, was 2018 a busy year? In addition to all of our education efforts, not a week went by without a meeting (or two) with our county partners, the architects, or the builders in solidifying our plans. It was a year that saw a dream that began over coffee take a BIG turn toward reality. And it was a year that set the stage for the exciting months and years ahead.

On behalf of all of your two, six, eight, and manylegged friends at the Missoula Butterfly House and Insectarium, thank you for being part of this dream and for your support and enthusiasm for our buggy mission. Together, we've come a long way. And together, exciting journey continues. \_\_\_\_

## 2019: The Year Ahead

But, as you know, great things don't just fall into your lap. And rarely does the timing of opportunities perfectly line up with all the other things happening in life. We definitely have a "few" things to accomplish in the year ahead and need to address some short-term challenges as we move forward.

First ...we're moving. Initially, the lease for the Insectarium's space was set to end in June. However, our landlord agreed to give us two additional months (until the end of August). While two months is not a lot, it's pretty significant in terms of allowing us to comfortably wrap up our field trips for the school year, run our summer camps, and take advantage of the busy summer months.

What happens after August? While we won't be replicating the Insectarium experience we've provided for the past 4 years, thanks to our friends at the Montana Natural History Center we'll have a small exhibit area with some of our critters on display. We're also searching for new office space and have a great opportunity unfolding that will accommodate the rest of our animals and provide space to continue some of our special programs. We'll share more details as this

What about field trips and programs? To maintain the strength of our education programs, we'll be doing a 180. Without the Insectarium as a field trip destination, instead of classes visiting us we'll be packing up some of our bugs and heading into classrooms. We'll also be setting up "pop up exhibits" in coordination with some of our partners to help ensure you have plenty of opportunities to get your "bug fix".

And to make the big transition to our future home possible, we're in the process of launching a capital campaign for our new facility ...allowing us to achieve our long-term dream of opening a tropical butterfly house. We'll be sharing more of the details once the framework of our campaign is finalized and underway.

As you can see, there's a lot on our plate for the months ahead. And YOU are an important part of the equation. Just as it took the support and enthusiasm of friends like you to open the Insectarium a few years ago, your partnership and support in the exciting journey ahead will be more important than ever.




