My long, slender, water repellant legs help me to distribute my weight. I use my short front legs for catching prey, my middle legs to row and my back ones to steer.

I am a swift, eight-legged predator with excellent eyesight and camouflage. My mottled gray, brown, or nearly white colors help me blend into my sandy surroundings on beaches and riverbanks. During the day you might find me hiding under debris or in a burrow. At night, a flashlight lights up my eight eyes!

I spent most of my life hunting under the water. Now that I am an adult I am a powerful flier and catch my meals in the air. Small flying insects like mosquitoes are my favorite! If you were to count the black spots on my four wings they would add up to twelve.

I am a brown, flat bug that can be up to three inches long. I am commonly called a "toe biter" because I can give a painful poke if threatened. I capture other insects, small fish, frogs, and even snakes to eat with my buff front legs. Besides rowing quickly underwater, I can also fly and am attracted to lights.
