I am yellow, with a black stripe on my back and black spots on the sides of my body. I may look like a caterpillar, but I am not! I am a type of insect closely related to wasps, bees, and ants and will fly in my adult stage. I love to eat leaves from trees. When eating I wrap my back end around a twig to hang on.

You can find me in patches of a native plant called Showy Milkweed. I am a red beetle with black spots and long antennae. My pattern isn't just beautiful, it's also a warning! I taste awful to potential predators thanks to all the toxic milkweed I eat! As a larva I fed on the roots. I now eat leaves, flowers.

You might find me and many others of my kind swarming on sunny fall afternoons. We kind of look like snow falling! We are tiny, and if not for our white, cottony wax wisps, you might not notice us at all! This wax helps to protect us from predators and keeps us from drying out!

I am the only predator on this week's report! I like to hunt around open, shallow ponds and marshes and grab live insects out of the air to eat. My two large eyes cover my head like a helmet and allow me to see in almost every direction at the same time. My wings are clear, lightweight, sturdy and flexible.
