New Exhibit: Leafcutter Ants





With opening day quickly approaching, we're incredibly excited to welcome a host of new species that will be the stars of our exhibits. Of course, there's the butterflies in the butterfly house. But that's just the beginning. Our exhibits will showcase beetles, tarantulas, praying mantids, hermit crabs, millipedes, walking sticks, and so much more. But one of the new species we're most excited for is our leafcutter ant colony. Currently consisting of about 25,000 individual ants, the colony will eventually grow to about 250,000.

The exhibit will be divided into three sections: chambers to house the colony and their food; a middle section the foraging ants need to traverse; and a section where we provide leaves for the ants. With worker ants constantly bringing pieces of leaves, flowers, or other vegetation back to the colony, the exhibit will provide an amazing opportunity to observe these insects in action.

While you might guess that the ants feast on leaves, each piece brought back is cleaned, prepared and used as fertilizer to grow a highly nutritious fungus that powers the colony. Leafcutter ants are actually farmers that have perfected their skills for millions of years.

Our exhibit will allow you to observe this mega power's complex division of labor, with each colony member working together for the betterment of all. While the single queen will be hidden deep in the brood chamber, you'll observe three different sizes of worker ants, each with a specific job to do – jobs that are assigned by certain genes being turned on or off depending on the needs of colony's workforce.

There's so much more to learn about these incredible animals. You'll just need to visit to experience this unique exhibit, and many more, for yourself!

- Approximately 80 degrees and 80% humidity all year long, the butterfly house lets you enter a tropical paradise on any day. Filled with around 500 free-flying butterflies, you'll see beautiful species from around the world.
- In the insectarium exhibit area, you'll learn about a host of live arthropods that include species of insects, arachnids, millipedes, centipedes, and crustaceans. Themed exhibits and microscope stations will introduce you to species native to Montana, the magic of metamorphosis, insect sounds, the invaluable services arthropods provide, and more.
- At the Animal Encounter Area, sit down with our staff and volunteers for up-close and personal introductions to some incredible species, most of which you can touch and hold.
- Join us for a predator feeding demonstration to learn how tarantulas, scorpions, praying mantises or other predators capture and eat their prey.
- Got a kiddo, who's had enough stimulation? Sit down to read an insect-themed book or do a puzzle together in our children's corner.
- A variety of special programs will allow families and learners of all ages to take a deeper dive into the amazing lives of some of the species we share our planet with.
- With a classroom to comfortably accommodate any school group, we look forward to hosting classes for grade-specific programming and exploration.

These are just some of the experiences and learning opportunities our new facility will offer.


